### EARLY HEAD START

The Early Head Start program has been dedicated to cultivating meaningful connections. EHS have been actively working on strengthening relationships between children. families, staff, and our community. High-quality, early learning experiences within safe, healthy, enriching, and inclusive environments help communities grow stronger by strengthening children's school readiness skills. Assessment data is collected three times per year using the Desired Results Developmental Profile (DRDP). School readiness skills are assessed in social/emotional, cognitive, language literacy, and physical development. EHS staff members analyze results from the child assessment and other sources. They guide individualized plans for the child, training and professional development plans, and program improvement plans.

EHS is a family-centered program designed to support parents as the most critical influence in their child's life. The program strives to engage parents and families through various activities, training, and educational opportunities.
